A BRIEF HISTORY

Potato Run Hollow was home to a thriving community in the 1800s and early 1900s. Residents could attend Potato Run Church, which was built in the 1850s and still holds weekly services. Families could send their children to School House No. 5, often called Potato Run School. There was also a leather tannery and a sawmill operated by the Odle Family in Potato Run Hollow. It is even rumored Mr. Hannel had a moonshine still in operation.



The Lewis Langdon homestead (pictured above) served as a place of refuge for the Daughtery Family when they were displaced from their Leavenworth houseboat by the 1937 flood. It is said they came up Potato Run in a rowboat and temporarily squatted in the home.

Cliff Dweller Trail is a moderately rugged 1.7 mile hiking trail which crosses Potato Run Creek and makes a loop through the hills above the creek. The northwest section of the trail runs along the edge of the bluffs above Potato Run. Hikers should be particularly careful while taking in the views along this portion. Also, hikers should not attempt to cross Potato Run when the water is high. Both trail heads are located at the Pioneer Picnic Shelter off the main state park road. Lewis Langdon travelled from his birthplace in Connecticut with his wife Louisa and their family and built his homestead in the 1830s, where the shelter stands.
