

#### Letter to the Governor

Dear Governor Bayh:

The year of 1995 saw a number of important milestones for Indiana's pari-mutuel racing industry. Hoosier Park opened the state's first satellite wagering facility in Merrillville on January 25th. By year-end, high-quality operations were also opened in Fort Wayne and downtown Indianapolis. Each of these facilities enhanced the quality of live racing at Hoosier Park by contributing significantly to its purse structure. Also in 1995, Hoosier Park conducted the state's first Thoroughbred race meet.

As in the past, the Commission continues to focus its energies on diligently regulating the pari-mutuel industry. The results of our regulatory efforts, along with statistics of interest, are highlighted in this report.

I am pleased to report that Indiana has gained a reputation throughout the Midwest for clean, honest and competitive racing. ## Year In Review

### January

- Governor Bayh appoints Mari George, Eddie Martin, Jr. and Tim Sams to the Thoroughbred Breed Development Advisory Committee.
- The Commission unanimously approves the issuance of a license to Hoosier Park to operate a satellite facility in downtown Indianapolis at Claypool Court.

Hoosier Park opens the state's first satellite wagering facility in Merrillville on January 25, 1995.

### April

- After several unsuccessful attempts to secure financing, Sagamore Park surrenders its permit to the Commission to construct a track in Shelbyville.
- The state's second satellite wagering facility opens for business in Ft.
   Wayne on April 26, 1995.

### May

 Hoosier Park set a single day systemwide handle record on Kentucky Derby Day with wagering totaling \$1,411,239.

### July

 Pacific Rocket wins the \$75,000 Dan Patch Invitational pacing to a track record 1:50.

### August

• Don Irvine, Jr. captures the driving championship with 109 wins. Doug Gosney tops the trainers standings with 52 victories.

### September

 On September 1, 1995, a crowd of 5,283 witnesses the first pari-mutuel throughbred race in the state's history. Ricky Faul, aboard Minnatoga, rides into the history books as the meet's first winner.

#### October

- On October 7, 1995, Peruvian, with Dean Kutz up, comes from off the pace to post a 1 3/4 length triumph in the inaugural running of the \$100,000 added Indiana Derby. A crowd of 5,726 sets an on-track single race record by wagering \$85,633 on the Derby.
- On October 25, 1995, Hoosier Park opens its third satellite wagering facility in downtown Indianapolis at the Claypool Court.
- Hoosier Park breaks its single day system-wide handle record set on Kentucky Derby Day when \$1,513,169 is wagered on Breeders' Cup Day.
- Ricky Faul runs away with the riding title with 59 wins. David Van Winkle tops the meet-ending trainers standing with 16 victories.

Hoosier Park statistics represent all wagering on out-of-state simulcasts (no live racing). The number of simulcast dates at Hoosier Park reflect any dates on which full card simulcasting took place. Special race simulcasting at Hoosier Park is included in the handle, but not in the number of dates. All OTB statistics represent all wagers at each location on both in-state and out-of-state simulcasting.

Attendance for simulcasting is as follows: Hoosier Park (122,779), Merrillville (107,007) and Ft. Wayne (54,275). Admission is not charged at the Indianapolis OTB, consequently, attendance is not counted.


## **State Revenues**

The direct revenue received by the State of Indiana exceeded the cost of regulation. Indiana Horse Racing Commission expenditures for calandar year 1995 were \$1,161,913.

# Occupational Licensing

Pursuant to IC 4-31-6 and 71 IAC 5-1-1, all persons participating in pari-mutuel racing under the jurisdiction of the Commission are required to be licensed. The licensing process is the backbone of the Commission's regulatory efforts. Each prospective licensee is fingerprinted. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the Indiana State Police provide the Commission with criminal histories of all applicants. The Commission may refuse or deny the application for licensure of any person whose criminal or racing violation record is contrary to the public's best interest.

In 1995, the Commission issued fifty-four (54) probationary licenses. The Commission refused ten (10) applications for licensure and revoked four (4) licenses.

**Note**: The fees indicated above do not include fingerprint fees paid directly to the Indiana State Police and the FBI.

# **Equine Drug Testing**

Pari-mutuel horse racing can succeed as a legitimate major league sport only if its races are perceived by the wagering public to be honest, competitive contests, free from manipulation by man or drugs. The equine drug detection program established by the Commission serves as an effective deterrent against the use of drugs. With the exception of furosemide (lasix) and phenylbutazone (bute), under regulatory restrictions, state law and commission rules prohibit the presence of any drug in horses racing at a pari-mutuel track. The Commission's drug detection program is one of the nation's most comprehensive and its laboratory one of the most respected in the racing industry.

Truesdail Laboratory in Tustin, California, serves as the primary testing laboratory for the Indiana Horse Racing Commission. Truesdail Lab has been a leader in racing chemistry and drug related research for over 50 years. Truesdail Laboratory is a member of The Association of Official Racing Chemist (AORC) and The Association of Racing Commissioners International's Drug Testing Standards and Practices Committee.

The following table indicates, by breed, the number of samples analyzed and the number of positive tests reported. In each instance, the offending horse was disqualified and placed last. In accordance with the parimutuel statute, all purse money earned is ordered returned and redistributed. The trainer of each offending horse was penalized by a suspension and/or fine.

# **Breed Development Programs**

#### Overview

Pursuant to IC 4-31-11, development funds have been established to promote the breeding of horses while stimulating the agri-business sector of the state's economy. All breakage and unclaimed winning tickets are statutorily earmarked for breed development. Standardbred and thoroughbred breed development advisory committees make recommendations to the Commission regarding the distribution of these monies.

#### Standardbred

The Standardbred Breed Development Advisory Committee has initiated an extensive program which allocates monies for Indiana sired, bred and/or owned, competing at Hoosier Park, the State Fair and several county fairs. In 1995, \$248,116 was distributed as awards and purse supplements to participating horse owners.

In 1996, with additional revenue, the breed can look forward to an enhanced program that include the inaugural competition of the Genesis Series designed for Indiana sired or owned fillies.

### Thoroughbred

The development program for the inaugural thoroughbred race meet at Hoosier Park in 1995 consisted of awards to winning Indiana breds totaling \$13,711. In addition, \$20,000 was supplemented to the Home Grown Handicap for Indiana bred or owned horses.

For 1996 and beyond, the Thoroughbred Breed Development Advisory Committee has formulated a comprehensive multi-layered program consisting of awards for breeders, owners and stallion owners.

## **Blood Gas Analysis Program**

The purpose of the Blood Gas Analysis (BGA) program is to deter and detect the practice of "bicarbonate loading" or what is known in the racing business as "milkshaking". This practice generally entails giving a horse a large quantity of a alkaline substance, usually baking soda, prior to a race. The alkaline substance neutralizes the lactic acid that is produced during exercise and, as a consequence, delays the onset of fatigue. Research has demonstrated that this practice induces some horses to race faster times. Bicarbonate loading can give a horse an unfair competitive edge and thus compromise the integrity of the sport. This practice is strictly prohibited by the rules of the Commission.

The BGA Program is operated by the Commission in a small laboratory located in the paddock at Hoosier Park. Blood samples of selected horses are analyzed prior to the race on a state-of-the-art blood gas analysis machine. Each sample is analyzed by a certified lab technician under contract through St. John's Hospital in Anderson.

# **Human Drug Testing**

Commission regulations provide that a licensee or an applicant for licensure may be required, if reasonable suspicion exists, to submit to a drug test.

The Commission tested fourteen (14) such individuals in 1995. Of that number, three (3) positive tests were identified and confirmed. In each instance, the licensee was suspended for a minimum of thirty (30) days.

## **Riverboat Revenue**

The statute permitting riverboat gaming in Indiana earmarks sixty-five (65) cents of the three dollar admission tax to the pari-mutuel horse racing industry. These funds are distributed to various segments of the racing industry in accordance with Commission rule 71 IAC 12-2-15.

The first riverboat revenues were generated on December 5, 1995, with the opening of the Casino Aztar in Evansville. The total allocated to racing was \$98,020.87.
