Celebrating Women's History Month at the Statehouse

There are several ways to celebrate Women's History Month at the Statehouse each year. Started by former Lt. Governor Becky Skillman, the <u>Hoosier Women Artists</u> contest is an annual competition established to celebrate Women's History Month. For eight years, it has highlighted talented female artists throughout Indiana. The contest celebrates the wide variety of graphic arts including drawing, painting and photography. Winners of the Hoosier Women Artists Contest have their artwork displayed in the Lt Governor's office for one year. To read more, visit:

The <u>Hoosier Heroine Essay Contest</u> was begun last year by Indiana's First Lady in conjunction with the Indiana Statehouse Tour Office. Students in grades 5 to 9 have an opportunity to complete an essay challenge. The 2015 topic is to discuss a pivotal moment in U.S. or Indiana history and the role Hoosier women played in it. Taking advantage of Indiana's current historic moment of having five concurrently serving women elected to statewide executive offices, the contest gives students an opportunity to visit the Indiana Statehouse as a special guest of First Lady Karen Pence and these extraordinary women. Winners are chosen by each of the five female office holder is charged with choosing a winning essay from a particular grade level and are announced at a reception in the Statehouse at the end of the month.

The <u>Indiana Historical Bureau</u> commemorates women's history year round through the many state historical markers and the <u>Indiana Statehouse</u> features a display celebrating Women's History Month in March. Located in the Rotunda, the display, *Women in Indiana Who Broke Barriers*, was designed by the <u>Indiana State Archives</u> and celebrates the life and work of four women who broke gender barriers in Indiana. Those featured include:

- Emma Christy Baker (1865-1955), the first African-American woman to be an officer with the Indianapolis Police Department;
- Antionette Dakin Leach (1859-1922), the first woman to challenge denial of admission to the Bar based on gender;
- Julia D. Nelson (1862-1936), the first woman to serve as a Representative in the Indiana General Assembly;
- Dr. Sarah Stockton (1842-1924), the first female physician at Central State Hospital in Indianapolis; and
- Lovina Streight (1830-1910), who earned her title "Mother of the Fifty-first" by accompanying the Fifty-first Indiana Volunteer Infantry at battle and nursed the sick and dving.

These are just a few of the ways to observe and celebrate Women's History Month. But, it shouldn't stop there. Learning about women in history should be an integral part of learning about both American history and Indiana history.
