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## Deaconess Health System to Launch New Access to Indiana's Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (INSPECT)

**Indianapolis, IN–July 24, 2017** – Today the Lieutenant Governor, Suzanne Crouch, joined Evansville Mayor, Lloyd Winnecke, President of Appriss Health, Rob Cohen, and leaders from the Indiana health community at Deaconess Gateway Hospital to announce the integration venture of the State's prescription drug monitoring program (PDMP). The Indiana PDMP, often referred to as INSPECT, is now available in electronic health records through Appriss Health's PMP Gateway. Appriss signed an agreement with Deaconess Health System, composed of six hospitals in Southern Indiana, providing access to PDMP data, tools and analytics. The available electronic health records will shorten the data search time from minutes to seconds creating a quick and efficient process for prescribers during every patient encounter.

With the new integration initiative, drug prescribers can quickly access patient information through the electronic health records, a cutting-edge tool for today's health professionals.
