- 1 over-voted. And those were handled properly
- 2 according to the manual procedures.
- 3 Ten counties reported that there were no
- 4 affected ballots found in those counties for any
- 5 of these over-voted ballots. Seven counties did
- 6 not respond. So we believe that Dominion complied
- 7 with Section 2A of the resolution.
- 8 Now we'll move on to Section 2B of the
- 9 resolution which is a software modification. We
- 10 did receive from Dominion a letter on
- 11 September 30th. That was the deadline imposed by
- 12 the resolution for a plan. And the letter is
- included in the report we submitted to the
- 14 Commission in an Appendix B.
- The letter in Appendix B was from the
- 16 Regional Manager of Sales from Dominion. And it
- 17 informed us that at that point Dominion was still
- 18 evaluating what software modifications might be
- 19 necessary and that they would like to discuss this
- 20 further with VSTOP prior to December 31st, 2016.
- 21 Subsequently VSTOP did communicate with
- 22 Dominion on several occasions and asked for a more
- 23 detailed plan. Because the letter of
- 24 September 30th did indicate that they were working
- on a plan, but we have not received a copy of the



- 1 plan. Subsequently we sent reminder to Dominion
- 2 for the plan, and we had a phone conference with
- 3 Dominion very recently, on -- on January 27th. Is
- 4 that right?
- 5 And in that phone conference we spoke with
- 6 representatives from Dominion who indicated to us
- 7 that they were still exploring options. And they
- 8 have certain reasons for asking that they be given
- 9 time to comply with the SEA-61 sections, but they
- 10 asked for more time. Subsequent to that we did
- 11 receive an e-mail from Dominion that they were
- 12 going send a representative to this Commission
- 13 meeting. And we see that we do have a
- 14 representative from Dominion, Mr. Ian Piper.
- 15 And in the letter that we received from
- 16 Dominion dated February 3rd, Dominion laid out a
- 17 number of reasons for their exploration of
- 18 software modifications indicating that these
- 19 working systems are approximately 20 years old.
- 20 They were manufactured by Global Election Systems,
- 21 the GEMS, in the early 1990s. They used older
- 22 versions of software and hardware. And Dominion
- is now exploring how to find help in getting that
- 24 software modified.
- 25 So we are at the stage where we -- we have



- 1 all these communications, but we have not seen a
- 2 plan yet for product enhancement.
- 3 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: And when was that plan
- 4 due?
- 5 DR. BAGGA: The plan was due on
- 6 September 30th last year.
- 7 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Anything else in your
- 8 report?
- 9 DR. BAGGA: That's it for the Section 2B,
- 10 Mr. Chairman.
- 11 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: All right. Is there a
- 12 representative from Dominion that would like to
- 13 speak?
- MR. PIPER: Sure. Ian Piper, I-a-n.
- 15 P-i-p-e-r. I'm the Director of Federal
- 16 Certification for Dominion.
- In regards to the equipment, it actually was
- 18 designed back in the earl -- the late '80s. And
- 19 Dominion does not have any staff on board right
- 20 now that is familiar with those languages that
- 21 were used for that code base. We have not been
- 22 able to locate any of the previous Premier or
- 23 Global staff that did work on the code base who
- 24 are willing to actually work on this -- on these
- 25 changes. And the changes definitely would require



- 1 code modification.
- 2 I've got a statement of work that we are
- 3 using to work with an actual third-party software
- 4 house that GPS and Dominion have located in
- 5 Illinois and that they are -- they believe that
- 6 they are willing and able to work with the
- 7 code-based languages we have, which are Turbo C
- 8 and Assembler as well as an early version of C.
- 9 So with that we are in the part of getting an
- 10 NDA and a contract worked out with this software
- 11 house. And we believe as well too that there are
- 12 other situations that we need to consider as well
- 13 for the code changes that may not have been
- 14 considered previously. And that's something that
- 15 we need to explore further with VSTOP in regards
- 16 to how that's going to be managed.
- 17 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Is there any plan prepared
- 18 at this point in time?
- 19 MR. PIPER: We don't have a timeline on that
- 20 because we have to get a -- a feasibility done by
- 21 the actual software house in order for them to be
- 22 able to say that, yes, they can go ahead and make
- 23 these coding changes. We believe the GEMS changes
- 24 are going to be relatively minimal, except for
- 25 this new condition that might need to be



- 1 implemented which has to do with two-card ballots
- 2 and the straight-party contest and the at-large
- 3 contest.
- 4 But with the AccuVote Optical Scan System,
- 5 that's sort of an unknown factor at this point in
- 6 time until we're actually able to go ahead with
- 7 that code and assess whether or not they'll be
- 8 able to go ahead and make those changes.
- 9 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Has Dominion submitted any
- 10 written requests for an extension of time in which
- 11 to submit its plan pursuant to the resolution?
- MR. PIPER: Only the e-mail which Jay Bagga
- 13 referenced from Monica Marics, who is the
- 14 Executive VP of Engineering and Certification for
- 15 Dominion.
- 16 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: What was the date of that
- 17 e-mail?
- DR. BAGGA: I have a copy right here, and
- 19 I'll read from that. And I -- I believe that the
- 20 Indiana Election Division has a copy that we sent
- 21 to the Commission.
- 22 So towards the end of this document Monica
- 23 Marics, the VP of the -- one of the VPs of
- 24 Dominion has stated that while the State has
- 25 requested completion of this work by March 1st,



- 1 2017, due to the items listed above -- and these
- 2 are the items that Mr. Piper talked about --
- 3 Dominions will -- Dominion will not be able to
- 4 meet this time frame.
- We understand the State's desire to have this
- 6 automated fix, and we'll continue to work towards
- 7 that goal. We will keep you appraised of our
- 8 developments in these areas as they materialize.
- 9 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: My question was related to
- 10 the plan that was due on September 30th, 2016.
- 11 Was there any written request for an extension of
- 12 that deadline?
- MR. PIPER: I'm not aware of that myself.
- 14 The -- the matter was handed to Gio Constaniello
- 15 at that time.
- 16 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: Mr. Chairman, if I
- 17 may.
- 18 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Yes.
- 19 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: How many -- how
- 20 many counties have Dominion machines?
- DR. BAGGA: There are twenty counties that
- 22 have Dominion systems. And Dominion has both VREs
- 23 and ob scan systems. And we have a chart here
- 24 that I'll read out from of the distribution among
- 25 counties and between the TSX, which are the DR



- 1 systems, and operating -- the -- the OS systems.
- 2 Dominion has a total of 216 OS units spread
- 3 across twenty counties. The largest one has
- 4 25 units. And then they're all the way down to
- 5 some counties with one unit. They also have 1,023
- 6 DREs. But this does not apply to DREs. So it's
- 7 216 units among the twenty counties that are
- 8 affected.
- 9 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: If I may, to the
- 10 staff. There's a representation in their letter
- 11 that says, No elections will be affected in 2017
- 12 within our customer base within those twenty
- 13 counties. Do any of those twenty counties, do we
- 14 know -- I mean, there could be referendums.
- MR. SIMMONS: Right. I -- I think they're --
- 16 Mr. Chairman, Members of the Commission, if I may.
- 17 I -- I think their -- their response -- yes,
- 18 you're right. There are referendums. White
- 19 County -- I think the clerk from White County,
- 20 here today, is having a referendum in May. I'm
- 21 not sure what they're saying. I mean, certainly
- 22 in a referenda the straight party wouldn't be a
- 23 factor.
- 24 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: Correct.
- MR. SIMMONS: In the, you know, that part of



- 1 the system, the logic won't impact referendum. I
- 2 don't know if that's what they're saying.
- 3 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: Okay. And then
- 4 there's -- the last paragraph says that they look
- 5 forward to talking with the -- the Division in
- 6 detail prior to December 31st, 2016. Was that --
- 7 was there a meeting? Did you attempt to schedule
- 8 anything with us on or before the 31st.
- 9 MR. PIPER: I wasn't tasked with anything at
- 10 that point in time.
- 11 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: When did you issue
- 12 your work order with the third-party software
- 13 house? When was the date of that issue?
- 14 MR. PIPER: That was back last -- beginning
- 15 of February.
- 16 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: You mean within ten
- 17 days ago?
- 18 MR. PIPER: Yes.
- 19 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: So September 30th
- 20 of '16 you say you're working on it. And then
- 21 ten -- within the last ten days you issued a work
- 22 order to the third party?
- MR. PIPER: Correct.
- 24 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Does VSTOP have a
- 25 recommendation with regard to compliance or



- 1 noncompliance?
- DR. BAGGA: We have not seen the plan for
- 3 product enhancement. So at this time we have no
- 4 report on whether the system is compliant because
- 5 we don't know what the plan is.
- 6 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay.
- 7 COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: Mr. --
- 8 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Go ahead.
- 9 COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: May I ask a
- 10 question?
- 11 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Sure.
- 12 COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: Do we know the
- 13 -- the contracts that these counties have with
- 14 Dominion, do we know what Dominion's obligations
- 15 are to those counties to be able to update and
- 16 maintain equipment to keep it compliant with
- 17 Indiana law?
- DR. BAGGA: So to answer that question, the
- 19 way the compliance was carried out in the 2016
- 20 election was to deploy the manual procedures for
- 21 that Section 3-12-1-7(f). But the -- the Indiana
- 22 Code requires automatic processing of that.
- 23 COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: No. I'm -- I'm
- 24 -- I'm asking, I guess, and -- and I -- and this
- 25 is probably beyond your purview. But I'm just



- 1 wondering if you have any knowledge of what the
- 2 requirements are between the -- because there --
- 3 there would have been at some sort -- at some
- 4 point some sort of contractual obligation between
- 5 Dominion and these counties to be providing -- to
- 6 maintain the equipment in a manner that kept it
- 7 consistent with Indiana law, regardless of what
- 8 those requirements of Indiana law are.
- 9 And I'm just wondering if we know whether
- 10 those contracts are still in force and effect or
- 11 -- or what is going on with respect to those.
- DR. BAGGA: So -- yes. So we can -- I -- I
- 13 believe VSTOP can partially answer that question
- 14 by pointing to an e-mail from -- again from
- 15 Dominion to -- to VSTOP which says that currently
- 16 none of the twenty AccuVote counties, Dominion
- 17 counties in Indiana, are under contract for
- 18 Dominion for any software maintenance.
- 19 COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: Oh. Okay, thank
- 20 you.
- 21 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Are there any clerks here
- 22 in the counties who would like to speak? Would
- 23 you state your name, please.
- MS. LANCE: My name is Paula Lance, White
- 25 County Clerk.



- 1 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Do you have any questions?
- MS. LANCE: I do have a concern. We have a
- 3 referendum. I -- I do believe Christa Coffey from
- 4 Tippecanoe County also too. How does -- how is
- 5 this going to affect my election? If -- if our --
- 6 if the system is not going to be in compliance,
- 7 do -- do --
- 8 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Well, my understanding
- 9 from the conversation here today is that the
- 10 referendums would not be impacted by the changes
- 11 that are necessary.
- MS. LANCE: And in -- in saying that --
- 13 that -- because the -- the referendum would not
- 14 affect the changes, that would still allow me to
- 15 use this equipment?
- 16 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: If the equipment remains
- 17 certified.
- MS. LANCE: Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: That's my understanding.
- 20 If anyone in the room has a different
- 21 understanding of how the straight-party ticket
- 22 changes from Senate Bill 61 would impact the
- 23 referendum, I'd be happy to hear from you.
- 24 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: If I may,
- 25 Mr. Chairman. To the White County Clerk: How



- 1 many machines -- you -- you weren't the one county
- 2 with twenty-five machines, were you?
- 3 MS. LANCE: No.
- 4 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: How many machines
- 5 do you have?
- 6 MS. LANCE: Are you talking optical scan?
- 7 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: Yes.
- 8 MS. LANCE: We only use the optical scan
- 9 during absentee voting. We only use paper ballots
- 10 for absentee voting and military mail-out. We use
- 11 the TSX machines in all of our vote centers.
- 12 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: Okay.
- MS. LANCE: As well as our -- during our
- 14 absentee time as well. But we do use -- we still
- 15 use paper ballots through optical scan for --
- 16 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: -- absentees.
- MS. LANCE: -- absentees.
- 18 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: Is there -- forgive
- 19 me with this question. Is this an absentee
- 20 process for referendums?
- MS. LANCE: Yes.
- 22 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: Yes.
- COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: So might the
- 24 bigger question be then if the -- if the
- 25 certification is currently into October, or



- 1 expires October 1, what's the -- what might the
- 2 impact then be on the November elections? And I
- 3 guess I don't know if there are November -- I
- 4 mean, there aren't regular November elections.
- 5 But are there any referenda -- are all the
- 6 referenda and everything, is that all scheduled to
- 7 occur in May and so that we don't have any
- 8 activity in November? Or we -- we never know what
- 9 we don't know.
- 10 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: I think they could
- 11 file a referendum after the May --
- MS. NUSSMEYER: Through October 1st, I
- 13 believe.
- MR. KOCHEVAR: August 1st.
- MS. NUSSMEYER: August 1st. Thank you. I'm
- 16 sorry. Thank you.
- 17 COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: Well --
- 18 MR. CONRAD: I can answer that question. My
- 19 name's Kyle Conrad. I'm with Governmental
- 20 Business Systems. We're the vendor for Dominion.
- 21 There will be no partisan offices in Indiana --
- 22 COMMISSION MEMBER OVERHOLT: Right.
- MR. CONRAD: -- on any ballot, whether it be
- 24 May or November. So the same theory for May
- 25 election should apply to November.



1 MS. NUSSMEYER: Except your certification expires on or before October 1st, 2017. 2 3 MR. CONRAD: Correct. But as far as this software change -- as far as the operation of 4 5 equipment is not -- not going to be impacted. COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: But uncertified 6 machines would not be used after --8 MR. CONRAD: I'm sorry? 9 COMMISSION MEMBER KLUTZ: But uncertified machines would not be used after --10 MR. CONRAD: Correct. 11 12 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Well, I would be remiss if I didn't express disappointment, as the Chairman 13 of the Indiana Election Commission, that our 14 Resolution 2016-1 regarding Dominion Voting 15 Systems has not seemed to have been taken very 16 17 seriously. 18 As you can tell from our discussions here with other vendors, we take every provision of 19
