I do know in the past that you have taken into consideration settlement agreements from those committees in the past. Given that there is not any consistent precedence being used, I would just say that the motion did say violation of a settlement agreement of which I think in part the committee when they accept these settlement agreement says, "Yes. We did violate the campaign finance law."

And so it would be at least my recommendation that you file the motion as it's plainly understood. Violation is a violation. So in this case, I think it would be the third violation for this committee for which 75 percent of the total of the penalty here in the hearing folder would be assessed.

That is just my thinking on that.
